## Community Bank Scholarship Program-10 YEAR LANDMARK

In 2014, the board of directors of Braidwood and Bungendore Community Bank branches, made the decision to enter into a Scholarship Program. The program gives the opportunity for the youth in our district to assist them in a financial manner when they enter university or TAFE studies.

Since 2014, the Community Bank has rewarded over 50 students and over \$300,000 in scholarship funding.

Director of the Community Bank and Scholarship Co-Ordinator, Mrs Dale Towell said "It has been my absolute privilege to be part of the Scholarship Program - for the chance to offer assistance to our students as they move forward with their lives, for the opportunity to give to the community as our purpose as a community bank board suggests and top of the list for me, the unexpected sense of pride in all the students that I'm fortunate to meet. It brings me back to this endeavour every year, and never fails to leave me feeling that those who follow us, will not simply make a difference, but they will make a good difference."

For 2024 a total of \$25,000 per year is allocated over a two-year duration of this program. We had 7 successful applications in Braidwood and Bungendore for University and TAFE study.

# Meet our Directors: Richard Elliott

(interviewed by Susi Pluess)

1. Richard, could you tell us a bit about your background and what led you to join the Board of Palerang Financial Services Ltd - Braidwood, Bungendore and Crookwell Community Bank Branches?

As a child I had been interested in electronics (back then it was called radio). My first serious job was at the NASA satellite tracking station at Orroral Valley in the ACT where I stayed for 12 years ascending the technician ladder and getting an Electronics and Communications Certificate. At the station there was an employee who acted as an agent for a small credit union which I joined purely as a customer. The station was scheduled to close in 1984 and its ground station role was taken over by other satellites. I had a number of technical jobs primarily in data communications before moving into project management. By sheer coincidence the Credit Union staff I had dealt with for years suggested I join the Board where I learnt much more about operating small financial institutions. This was at a time where increasing compliance requirements caused amalgamations and the gst bogeyman was approaching. Around another 12 years I lead various projects the largest of which was an optical fibre network around Canberra. I retired in 2008.

# 2. What are some of the key responsibilities you have as a Board member?

As a board member you bring your own skills and experience to the table. The worst board structure would be 10 clones who agreed on everything. We have a healthy board where everyone has their say. We are in a sound position which makes providing guidance to management pleasant. I usually present the Braidwood funding applications as spokesperson but in reality any of us on that subcommittee could do it. As Directors we share responsibility for future success.

3. How does Palerang Financial Services Ltd support the local community, and what role do you play in this?

The great thing about the Bendigo Community Bank model is that we signed up to provide the major part of the profit back to the community and a lesser amount to the shareholders (who have to be locals).

There are pretty sensible rules about how we fund community projects. If we have an underspend in a financial year Bendigo provides a mechanism where we can 'park' funds until another big project comes along.

# 4. What is the most rewarding aspect of being a Board member?

There is great satisfaction in being part of a successful friendly team meaning the staff as well as the Directors. As part of one of the community funding committees we meet interesting applicants to discuss their proposals.

# 5. Can you share a memorable experience or achievement from your time on the Board?

A bit tongue in cheek. We were debating our first community contribution for over one million dollars. We have funded quite a few over \$100,000. There was agreement that it was worthwhile but the discussion turned into being about the sheer enormity of it. I cheekily offered that we didn't baulk at \$100K so why worry about an extra zero!

# 6. How do you see the future of Community Banks, and what are your hopes for the Community Banks Braidwood, Bungendore and Crookwell?

We are deep in the Chinese curse of 'May you live in interesting times'. Our society is changing rapidly and in many ways not for the better. Climate change, the wealth gap, housing, congestion, aging population, supply chain disruption, dependence on the Internet and global politics. We are demonstrating that there is a viable and better for society banking model than that offered by the 'big four'. Without our Community Bank funding many of our community groups would struggle financially.

# 7. Outside of your role at Palerang Financial Services Ltd, what are some of your personal interests and hobbies?

I have recently stepped back from my role in the RFS after 10 years as the local Captain. I enjoy instructing especially the BCS students who we have for a week for the 'cadet program'. It is really rewarding to see twenty year 9/10 students put on a display in front of the whole school of the skills they have learnt in just  $4 \frac{1}{2}$  days.

8. What advice would you give to someone considering getting involved with their local Community Bank?

As a potential customer I'd say just try us. We have friendly, helpful staff and your banking with us helps you and the local community. If you are interested in being a board member, talk to one of the Directors to get a better idea of what it involves and if it appeals, lodge an application.

The Respect and Protect initiative, led by social enterprise Flequity Ventures, asks businesses to protect customers and communities against financial abuse, particularly in the banking, insurance, telecommunications, and energy sectors where perpetrators have the ability to threaten their victims or accrue debt on their behalf. More than 20 businesses now include financial abuse in their Terms and Conditions or have pledged to introduce measures soon.


#### **Digital Footprint**

#### Why is there a Bank Holiday?

Everyone loves a 3 day long weekend and bank staff are no exception. On the first Monday in August each year it is known as the NSW Bank Holiday. But why did it originate and why do we still have the holiday?

The NSW Bank Holiday originated in the United Kingdom of compensating counting house staff

for extra work involved in the June 30 end of financial year balances by granting them a holiday on the first Monday in August. this idea then flowed into Australia and was first introduced in New South Wales by the Bank Holiday Act of 1875. The holiday was observed on the first day of August each year, however, it was then changed in 1912 to be the first Monday in August. this has remained unchanged.



Of course, the manual balancing of ledger books in banking has changed over the years and computers have assisted in the majority of banking procedures. Banking itself has changed dramatically over the years with internet banking, Tap and Go, forms of insurance, continual policy, procedural and governance updates just to name a few



The major difference that has not changed at the Community Banks of Bendigo Bank is our commitment to our customers and our community. It comes first and always will. Direct telephone lines to our branches, the majority of the staff and directors being local residents and a banking model that means a large percentage of profits at our local branches go back into the community in the form of sponsorships, grants and donations. 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



#### Powered by Community: Celebrating 100 Years of Goulburn's Motorcycle Grand Prix

The rumble of over 150 bikes moving through town on Friday evening, announced the start of festivities; and to follow, a display of vintage and veteran machines, pushing Goulburn's rec area pavilion to maximum capacity; a fund raising evening hosting family members of those who raced in 1924, plus dinner, dignitaries, auction announcement of who won the Indian Scout Bomber valued at \$23,995; the Komatsu FMX experience feature; over 4,000 visitors who gathered to salute Goulburn's racing history.

But the focal point of the weekend was Sunday's 23 June rally. Held 100 years to the day from the original Grand Prix Race in Goulburn and rolling the same track as those young men did in 1924.

It was an event generously supported by our Community Bank. Board Deputy Chair Dale, said 'It is was a ride unlike the first in that it mirrored the difference of our time, but was identical of heart, and our opportunity to recognise those young riders of 1924'. Over 500 motorcycles joined in this rally. First out the gate were 1924 and earlier models. To follow these were a chronological parade of motorcycling history. Residents along the route set up deck chairs and picnics at their gates, on their verandahs and in the best vantage points to be found. They invited friends and the rally route was lined with supporters. They lit up BBQs and bonfires - and they waved on each rally rider with the most amazing swell of support. It brought many to
